Queen Bey was the first jazz artist to receive the coveted Governor's Arts Award, given to her in recognition of her efforts in promoting the heritage of jazz and the blues.



Performing with one of Kansas City's most dynamic quartets, Ms. Bey "epitomizes the true jazz singer, in that she comes from a vocal tradition that is rooted in older African American musics such as blues, spirituals, and gospel. 

Jazz Takes The Stage

Rarely, does an artist master stage, television, and film. Queen Bey may be the consummate "artist". Her repertoire includes the Broadway musicals *Ain't Misbehavin"*, *One Mo' Time, Blues in the Night, George Washington Slept Here*, and *Back Stage with Dinah Washington*. In addition to her stage performances, Ms. Bey has appeared in the NBC mini

series Matter of Justice which co-starred Martin Sheen and Patty Duke, and on film in the movie Ninth Street, with Martin Sheen and Issac Hayes. Queen Bey co-composed the musical score It's a Blues Life for Ninth Street.

Queen Bey has appeared with playwrights August Wilson, and Neil Simon. She coauthored Back Stage with Dinah Washington, and was



recognized for her theatrical performance in *Ma Rainey's Black Bottom* at the prestigious Inge Festival.

In 2002, Queen was honored at the Oscar Micheaux Film Festival where she spoke about the role of Jazz and Blues music in film and received a standing ovation for her performance.

Kansas City's Ambassador of Jazz

Queen Bey is the jazz and blues diva extraordinaire who has been hailed as Kansas City's Ambassador of Jazz.

Queen began singing at the age of five, and by the age of twelve she was performing in clubs throughout Kansas City, one of the birthplaces of jazz music.

Accompanied by a chaperone, Ms. Bey was allowed to work in clubs that chose to overlook her young age in defer-



ence to her obvious talent and stage presence. She received training from Billie Holiday and Ella Fitzgerald, singers of mythic proportion, while performing at the legendary Orchid Room.

A classy, scat-singing vocalist, she brings to mind such musical legends as Bessie Smith, Dinah Washington and Sarah Vaughn. Her repertoire ranges from blues and ballads to classic jazz, scatting, and improvisation. Ms. Bey is also a talented actress and composes and arranges music.
